Learning Notes for Teachers

Each book starts the same way... This is Finn, Finn is thin...

Ask the students if they can recall how the book starts...

There are lots of rhyming words in each story:

 Ask the students to call out or write down the rhyming words that they hear.

Finn undertakes a lot of activities in each story, such as sleeping, bathing, walking, singing, driving etc... A great example of verbs.

 Ask the students what activities they can recall Finn undertaking in each story.

Learning Notes for Teachers

Discuss the concept of a **ROUTINE** (doing something at the same time each day) to the children and why they think it is important to have a routine as part of their daily lives.

Why do they think it is important to repeat things regularly, like brushing teeth, writing letters, spelling, practicing an instrument etc...

Get them to make a list of what they do on a daily basis:

For example: School day or Weekend

At 7am I wake up and brush my teeth, I have breakfast and put on my school uniform. My mum/dad walks me to school. I have lunch every day with my friends. I do an afer school activity. I watch cartoons when I get home. My mum makes dinner at 6pm. I have a bath at 7pm and I go to bed at 8pm. My mum reads me a story and tucks me in....

Ask the children what part of their day feels like an adventure...


Creative Workshop Ideas 1

After the teacher or facilitator has read or shown the selected stories to the children, a creative story-making workshop can be conducted with the students in the following ways:

Kindergarten – Grade 3:

- Consider the theme and characters in each story Turning everyday activities into an adventure, friendship, expressing your individuality...
- Conduct a short story-making workshop using paper and colouring materials such as pencils, pens, crayons, coloured paper etc.
- Paper can be stapled together to male a little booklet if desired.
- The student is the protagonist/main character who goes on an adventure and takes a little friend along with them (Just like Finn has the little mouse).
- The student writes the short story and creates images to go with it.
- The story can be 1 − 5 pages in length.
- This can be a project that takes place in one two lessons if required.
- All storylines, images and characters drawn by the children should be deemed acceptable.

Creative Workshop Ideas 2

After the teacher or facilitator has read or shown the selected stories to the children, a creative story-making workshop can be conducted with the students in the following ways:

Grades 4 - 6:

- Turning everyday activities into an adventure, friendship, expressing your individuality...
- Conduct a story-making collage workshop using paper and collage materials such as images from magazines, textured items, coloured paper.
- Paper can be stapled together to male a little booklet if desired. Images are glued onto the paper.
- The student is the protagonist/main character who goes on an adventure and takes a little friend along with them (Just like Finn has the little mouse).
- The student writes the story and creates collage images to go with it.
- The story can be 1 10 pages in length.
- This can be a project that takes place over one four lessons if required.
- All storylines, images and characters drawn by the children should be deemed acceptable.

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The Trend towards E-Books in the 21st Century

Young children's use of digital devices is increasing as we progress through the 21st century and handheld and mobile devices, such as smartphones and tablets, have become increasingly available.

Children are growing up in a digital media environment where interactions with digital media are an increasing part of children's daily lives in classrooms and at home. More children, across all levels of society, are using interactive and mobile media on a daily basis.

As a result of this exposure to technology, children today have many opportunities to explore digital devices and play with them. Many activities in children's lives are digital, including early literacy experiences. Children's books are increasingly available in a digital format on electronic devices - often handheld and mobile.

With digitization, new opportunities for the mediation of multimodal text have emerged. Among the potential advantages of e-books is that they are easily accessible and interactive for beginning readers who cannot yet decode text or are just beginning to learn to decode.

Even children with emergent literacy skills who cannot yet read can explore e-books by themselves without the help of an adult.
